

Glossary/Key Terms

Assistance for Children with Severe Disabilities (ACSD)

This program helps parents with some of the extra costs of caring for a child who has a severe disability, up to the age of eighteen.

Community Integration through Cooperative Education (CICE)

Individuals with cognitive disabilities and learning challenges may access this inclusive education program at Ontario Colleges. This allows the individual to attend college with the required accommodations and modifications. There are application requirements.

Developmental Services Ontario (DSO)

The DSO manages all provincially-funded developmental services for adults with a developmental disability in Ontario. Applications to the DSO should be completed starting at the age of sixteen. Examples of services that are referred through the DSO are: community participation, residential services, person-directed planning, behavioural services and Passport funding (see below).

Individual Education Plan (IEP)

A document that may be developed when a student's needs are such that they require individualized programming. This plan is meant to support your son or daughter's well being so he or she can reach their full potential at school.

Integrated Transition Plan (ITP)

A plan developed in cooperation with outside services that support students with developmental disabilities, focusing on the transition from secondary to post-secondary. This integrated transition plan will begin at the age of fourteen.

Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP)

ODSP helps people with disabilities pay for living expenses such as food and housing. Applications should be completed six months prior to the student's eighteenth birthday.

Ontario Certificate of Accomplishment

Students who earn less than fourteen credits may be granted a Certificate of Accomplishment. This is accompanied by the student's Ontario Student Transcript.

Ontario Secondary School Certificate (OSSC)

The OSSC will be granted to students who have earned a minimum of 14 credits (which includes 7 optional credits and 7 compulsory credits).

Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD)

In order to earn an OSSD, the student must earn a minimum of 30 credits (which includes 18 compulsory credits). Students must also complete 40 hours of community involvement activities, in addition to passing the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT).

Passport funding

A government program that provides funding for adults with a developmental disability to participate in the community. Applications to Passport funding must be completed through DSO (see above).

Special Services at Home (SSAH)

The SSAH program helps families who are caring for a child up to the age of 18 with a developmental or physical disability. It is funded and managed by the Ministry of Community and Social Services.

National Educational Association of Disabled Students (NEADS)

The National Educational Association of Disabled Students (NEADS), has the mandate to support full access to education and employment for post-secondary students and graduates with disabilities across Canada.

Continuing Education- Adult Students

There are programs that assist adult students in attaining their OSSD or OSSC. This may be discussed with the school-based team during transition meetings.

This transition resource is designed to raise awareness about supports in our school board that promote student well-being through transitions. You are invited to inquire about initiatives for under-represented groups as we strive to meet diverse needs within our learning community.

Transition Planning

Supporting students and their families as they transition from secondary school

What is a Transition Plan?

A transition plan will identify the specific actions required as a student moves through each year at school. The plan may be reviewed and updated as part of the Individual Education Plan (IEP).

Examples of transitions include:

- Moving from grade to grade
- Moving from school to school
- Planning for life after secondary school
- Moving from home to school; or from school to home.

Transition planning requires a team approach that includes the student, school staff and parent(s)/guardian(s). It may also include school board support staff and outside agencies.

Transition Planning

The key in the transition process is early and ongoing planning to identify post-secondary options (e.g. school, work, apprenticeship and community programs).

- Review previous plan if applicable, which may include:
 - o Educational goals
 - o Pathway choices
 - o Community living goals/vocational goals
 - o Time management/organization skills
 - o Employability readiness
 - o Life management skills
 - o Self-advocacy skills
 - o Problem solving/decision making skills.

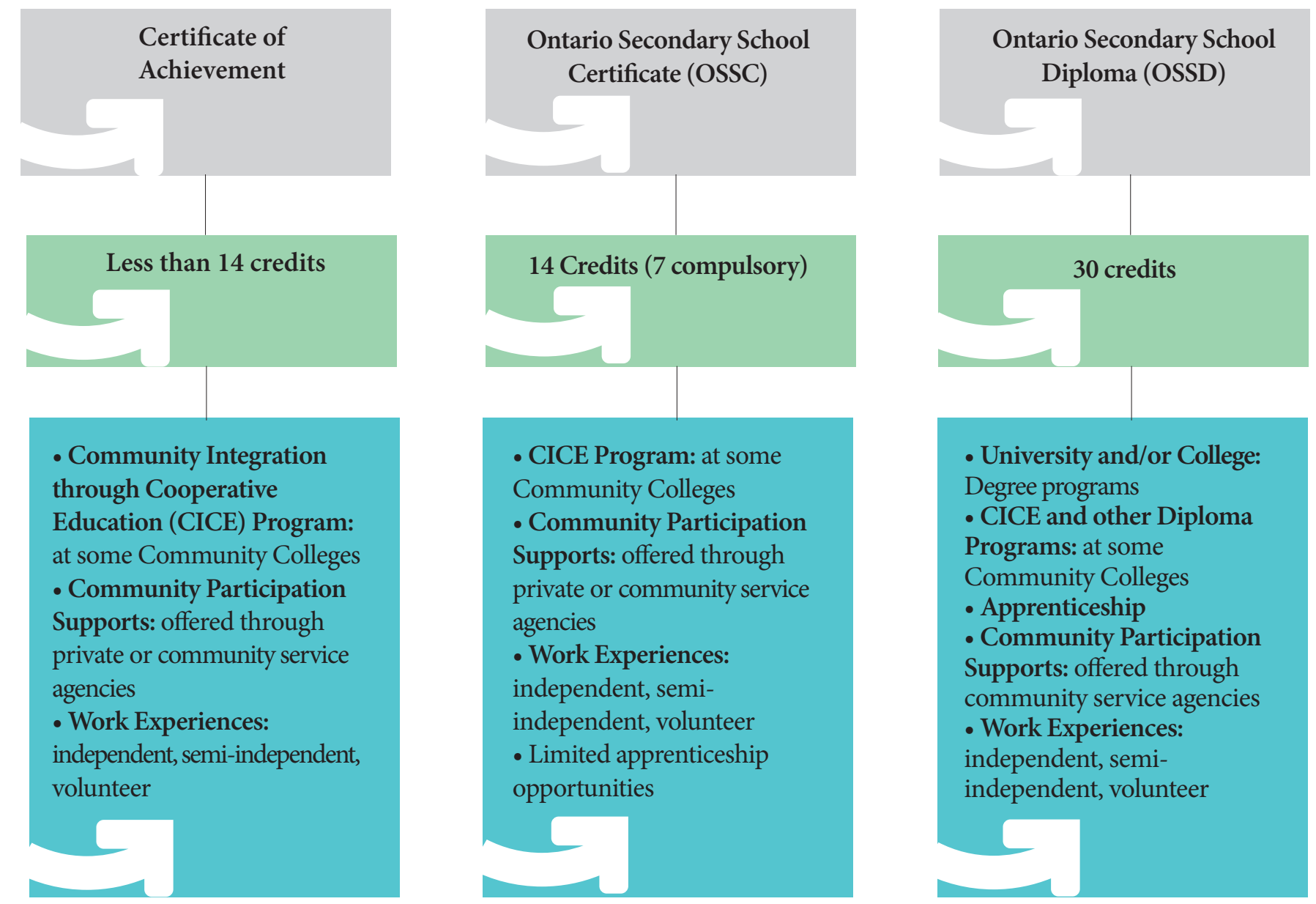

Transitioning From Secondary School

Three Years Before Leaving Secondary School:

- With the support of the school team, students may:
- Review school accomplishments to date to determine the best pathway options (e.g. portfolio, Individual Pathways Plan – IPP)
 - Learn and practice communication skills and social skills for different settings (e.g. school, recreational, employment and social)
 - Continue developing the Integrated Transition Plan (ITP) if appropriate
 - Practice independent living and life management skills
 - Review employability readiness, volunteer work, co-op and part-time employment
 - Begin a resume and update as needed
 - Determine the expected date of graduation and review annually
 - Track their 40 hours of community service



Two Years Before Leaving Secondary School:

- With the support of the school team, students may:
- Explore community support services and programs in discussion with Guidance, SERTs and Student Success
 - Explore options for future living arrangements
 - Match career interests and skills with course work and community work experiences
 - Gather more information on post-secondary programs and the support services offered
 - Explore options for financial support
 - Continue developing the ITP if appropriate
 - Track their 40 hours of community service

One Year Before Leaving Secondary School:

- With the support of the school team, students may:
- Apply to post-secondary programs for further education (Ontario University Application Centre – OUAC; Ontario College Application System – OCAS). Check with Guidance for important deadlines.
 - Apply or review academic financial support programs, where needed (e.g. Ontario Student Assistance Program – OSAP)
 - Work together with outside agencies to investigate post-secondary employment, apprenticeship opportunities or student specific pathway (e.g. volunteer opportunities, day programs)
 - Continue developing the ITP if appropriate
 - Gather important documents to support applications or further access to services. Examples may include:
 - o Ontario Student Transcript
 - o Identification Placement and Review Committee (IPRC) description of strength(s) and need(s), statement of decision
 - o Most current Individual Education Plan (IEP)
 - o Reports of assessment (e.g. progress, educational, medical, psychological, speech and language)
 - o Any correspondence between outside agencies/institutions regarding transition (e.g. physiotherapy reports, team meeting minutes)
 - Track their 40 hours of community service
